Faith in the City 1849 - 2019

Two Distinguished Guests of the 170th Anniversary

In celebration of the 170th anniversary, St John's Cathedral is welcoming two distinguished guests: The Rt Revd Professor N T Wright, a world-renowned scholar and formerly Bishop of Durham, and Presiding Bishop Michael Curry of the US Episcopal Church, who gave a spirited and unforgettable sermon at the royal wedding earlier this year and preached at St John's in February 2017.



n the theme of "Faith in the City", the 170th anniversary celebration was launched at the 9.00 am service on 2nd December, Advent Sunday, when the celebrant and preacher was Archbishop Paul Kwong. A liturgical banner, with the new logo of the 170th anniversary, was blessed at the service.

St John's Cathedral intends to involve all congregation members and friends of the Cathedral in celebrating the 170th anniversary, counting the many blessings throughout the years, and engaging the wider community in the Cathedral's work and ministries.

As part of the celebrations, the St John's Public Lecture series will be held in March 2019. The keynote speaker will be The Rt Revd Professor N T Wright, professor of the School of Divinity at the University of St Andrews in Scotland, and one of the world's leading New Testament scholars who has spent a lifetime studying



New Testament scripture and early Christianity.

The Rt Revd Professor N T Wright will preach at the 9.00 am service on 17th March 2019, and give two public lectures at St John's on 18th March and 20th March 2019. The highlight of the series will be the Evening Lecture at the University of Hong Kong on 21st March 2019, on the subject of "Rethinking Heaven and Hell".

The Cathedral is inviting all – Anglicans, Christians from different denominations, and members of the public – to the public lectures. The Evening Lecture will start at 7.30 pm. Registration for the lecture will open soon.

As a prolific author, The Rt Revd Professor N T Wright has written over 50 books on understanding scripture, including "Surprised by Hope: Rethinking Heaven, the Resurrection, and the Mission of the Church", "Simply Jesus: A New Vision of Who He Was, What He Did, and Why He Matters", and "Scripture and the Authority of God: How to Read the Bible Today". He has also written an extensive series of popular commentaries on the New Testament; to name a few, "Matthew for Everyone", "John for Everyone", and "Mark for Everyone". His works are a bridge between the Church and academia.

Another special guest for the 170th anniversary celebration is Presiding Bishop Michael Curry of the US Episcopal Church. Bishop Curry's sermon at the wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle in May 2018 had a global audience of two billion hear him proclaim the power of God's love.

Bishop Michael Curry is the first African-American to head the US Episcopal Church. He was installed as presiding bishop of the US Episcopal Church on 1 Nov 2015. He often speaks on progressive issues of social justice, such as immigration policy and marriage equality.

In November 2019, Bishop Curry will visit St John's again and be the guest preacher at the Thanksgiving Service for the 170th anniversary celebration. His sermon at St John's back in February 2017 impressed many of the parishioners.

Other services and events of the celebrations include the Marriage Thanksgiving Service (16th February 2019), St John's Carnival (24th February

2019), and Blessing Hong Kong Service (30th June 2019, TBC).

St John's extends a warm invitation to all couples married at the Cathedral to the Marriage Thanksgiving Service. The service is a chance for couples to give thanks for the time they have had together and to look forward to the development of their relationship. It is a public declaration of their love for each other, and brings new energy to their partnership.

Couples married at St John's Cathedral are welcome to attend the service. Please register for the service at the Cathedral Office. Further announcements will be made on the Cathedral website. Registration forms will be available at the Cathedral Office and the Cathedral website.

Last but not least, the forthcoming St John's Carnival will be a unique opportunity to showcase the Cathedral's ministries. Information booths and game booths will be set up at Chater Road, with stunning performances by different groups.

History of St John's Cathedral

PART TWO

1897

Refurbishment Programme

In 'Church Notes' in 1897, Chaplain Francis Cobbold published a 'wish list' of items for donation to improve the church's sparse and scruffy look. It was the beginning of 20 years of gradual interior refurbishment. Much was given, some of it lost now. The pulpit came from Governor Robinson. The original bishop's throne came from the sons of Bishop Alford. The stone font was given. The sanctuary was extended with its marble floor. The William Morris reredos was donated in 1919. Electric light was installed in 1907. The ceiling fans were donated in 1923, costing \$4000 and the 'punkahs' finally dispensed with.

1899

The First Assistant Chaplain

Up to now, the chaplain had worked only with occasional help from outside clergy. In 1899 Bishop Hoare found funds to appoint the Revd Frederick Johnson to assist Cobbold. When Cobbold retired, Johnson succeeded him but there was little money for a new assistant. In 1913 Sir Paul Chater raised \$12000 (mostly his) which was matched by Governor Henry May to establish an Assistant Chaplains Fund. The Revd HGH Griffiths was the first appointee. By 1928 the post had become firmly established.

1921

The Chater Endowment

St John's had few endowments and a hand-to-mouth income. It was frequently close to financial collapse. In the tradition of the biblical figure, St John's Good Samaritan was a surprising man, even a shock in British colonial society. Sir Paul Chater was an Indian of Armenian descent and keen to be a prominent figure and benefactor in that society. He worshipped at St Andrew's rather than St John's, but he gave the Cathedral an endowment of \$25,000, which, in the nick of time, picked it up off the floor. It was a turning point in a struggle to survive.

The Church Hall

The Li Hall, which was originally known as the Church Hall or the New Hall, was built in a year and opened on 31 January 1921 by Governor Sir Reginald Stubbs. The Cathedral had no supporting buildings at that time and there was a particular need for a Sunday school room. It was paid for largely with \$5000 from Sir Paul Chater and \$20,000 from a barrister, M.J.D. Stephenson, who had wished to remain anonymous at the time. The day before that opening, the governor had unveiled the war memorial Celtic cross, across the path.





1927

The Last Pipe Organ

The last pipe organ to be played in the Cathedral was built by Mr Blackett, a renowned and sole European organ builder in Asia, and was a rebuild on the ruins of its predecessor on the south side of the chancel. It was completed in 1927, with the organ box in the now St Michaels' Chapel. The cost was \$14,000. It was an impressive instrument to see and to hear. It featured in the first broadcast service from the Cathedral in that year by ZBW radio. Although there are pictures of it, no recordings of the organ survive.

1935

The Growth of Holy Communion

In the early twentieth century, many Anglican churches were not sacramental in worship. Matins was the central service on Sunday, not the Eucharist. From 1929, Dean Swann, backed by Bishop Duppuy, began the slow move towards putting Holy Communion at the centre of worship. By 1935 there was one Sung Eucharist a month and a 12.15 pm Holy Communion on Sundays. A Holy Communion at 7.45 am took place every third Sunday, followed by a breakfast. By the time he arrived in 1933, Bishop R.O. hall reported that 100 people were attending.

1930

Present Day Governance Established

After years of discussion and planning by Bishop Charles Duppuy and Dean Alfred Swann, the 1930 Church of England Trustees Ordinance modernized the government of St John's. The renting of seats was abolished. Instead of seatholders, church members who registered on an electoral roll became the voters. The Annual Church Meeting became the Church Body and now elected a Cathedral Council to which it delegated its executive authority. All the fabric and finances of the Cathedral were vested in the Trustees and they delegated the care for, maintenance and administration of the Cathedral to the Council. It was a balance of vesting and delegating and thus it is today.

1938

Michaelmas Fair and Outreach

St John's can be identified as reaching out to the less fortunate in an organised way in the years just before the Second World War. Donations were being made towards child protection and lepers in China. Food and shelter was being provided to refugees from the Japanese invasion of the Mainland, and there are instances where the Li Hall was used. People from the Cathedral founded and operated the Street Sleepers Shelter Society, which at times accommodated over 16,000. In 1938 the very first Michaelmas Fair was organised.

FLAVOURS OF MYANMAR

Flavours of Myanmar on 15th September was not just a thoroughly enjoyable social event but a celebration of our partnership with the Diocese of Toungoo. Expertly emcee'd by Debbie McGowan, the evening gave us an opportunity to explore the colour and culture of Myanmar, raise funds for Toungoo's much needed building programme and socialise with our fellow parishioners.

Dean Matthias welcomed everyone and thanked Debbie and the organising committee for their hard work. After a video greeting from Bishop John Wilme, the doxology was sung in Burmese and the evening began in earnest. A group of friendly Myanmar students taught us some greetings (it seemed to take a very long time to say 'hello') and Sakura, from Yangon, danced in her lovely traditional costume while the students sang.

Catherine, who's made two trips to Toungoo, reminded us that although there is much that we can do to help the work of the church in Toungoo, this partnership is not principally about finance but about working together to discern God's plan for us and help bring about His kingdom. Taking the fruit of the Spirit in Galatians 5.22-23 as her theme, Catherine introduced four parishioners who'd been to Toungoo with her, to speak about four of the fruits, joy, peace, patience and kindness.

Focused on joy, Andrea Nye from St Stephen's told us that despite Toungoo

being a very poor place - 'not a bottle of gin in the whole town!' - it is far from miserable. 'They have joy in spades!'

Sidesman Lee Clubb remarked that Toungoo's very devout Christians reminded him of his youth in the southern USA and talked about the peace between the denominations. Catholics, Baptists and Anglicans all cooperate with each other and there is a strong sense of Christians working together for the good of the whole church.

Chris Hall was very amusing about his need for patience in Toungoo. After volunteering to teach adults, he was confronted with a class of three to five year-olds, despite his only previous contact with children being his goddaughter, who burst into tears whenever he picked her up. The good news was that the kids survived without tears. Even better, so did Chris.



Fiona Lo was troubled by the difficult conditions she encountered in Toungoo but deeply touched by the kindness of the people. Even though life is much tougher than in Hong Kong, there is a strong sense of everyone serving with kindness.

Debbie talked about her experience of teaching in Toungoo and stressed how valuable further input from St John's would be. There is also a pressing need for new buildings, particularly to provide accommodation for students from rural areas, who would otherwise have no access to secondary education.

An excellent dinner was followed by a live auction, with every dollar raised going straight to Toungoo. The auction was run very professionally by Fr Robert, looking dashing in his blue and white striped auctioneer's jacket, complete with a sunflower in the lapel. A host of charming assistants was on hand to display the sale items to eager buyers.

Mostly appropriately, an elegant Guess Felix handbag was modelled by Felix, while James Choo flaunted a Jimmy Choo bag. The excitement level rose for The Glenlivet 18 year old single malt, while other highlights included dinner at Chris Hill's amazing antique-packed flat at the Peak and a thrilling battle between servers and choir – personified by James Choo and John Li - for a Selangor tea caddy. The servers were victorious.

We then watched a demonstration of how to apply Thanaka, the cream made from ground bark, which Burmese women use to protect their faces from the sun. It was the gentlemen's turn next, as four guys bravely volunteered to learn how to tie the traditional longyi. Debbie's stern insistence that 'It's really very simple!' was rather at odds with their entertaining efforts. After a very quick practice, the volunteers took part in a longyi-tying competition to the strains of Mission Impossible and then modelled them seductively on stage.

After a Myanmar fashion show in which Dean Matthias, Catherine and a number of parishioners sashayed through the hall in a range of colourful garments, the Dean gave closing thanks on behalf of Bishop John to all those who had made the evening such a success. Dean Matthias reminded us that our partnership with Toungoo, a place of limited resources but generous people, teaches us to be generous too.

The choir sang an Irish blessing and we hurried home before the wrath of Tropical Storm Mankhut descended on Hong Kong.

FIRST *Cursillo* IN HONG KONG FAN INTO FLAME THE GIFT OF GOD IN YOU

Fifteen members of St John's Cathedral and the daughter churches made a special journey to a retreat house on Cheung Chau Island in mid-October to experience the very first 'Cursillo' short course in Hong Kong, with the theme 'Fan Into Flame the Gift of God in You' (2 Tim 1:6). Anglicans from all over Australia, including Bishop Ian Palmer, joined together to gift Cursillo to the Anglican Church of Hong Kong.

'Cursillo' is a Spanish word meaning a short course, but Cursillo is a worldwide movement for spiritual renewal in the Church.





"Cursillo' is a Spanish word meaning a short course, but Cursillo is a worldwide movement for spiritual renewal in the Church. Cursillo is about building a community of encouragement in faith and Christian life that spreads into the wider church.

'Cursillo across Australia has been a movement which has brought energy and life to many dioceses of the Anglican Church of Australia. Cursillo does not take the place of Church. It is a movement of encouragement within it. It is a bit like yeast going through the whole (batch of) dough in order to leaven everything,' Bishop Ian Palmer, the Link Bishop with the Anglican Cursillo Movement of Australia, explained.

Bishop Ian said, 'Cursillo has encouraged people who are in a time of questioning. It has drawn people into vocations for lay leadership or to be ordained as clergy. It has strengthened and encouraged groups in prayer and Bible study. It has increased the ministries we have taken to the needy, the marginalised, and the oppressed people as well. Therefore it has been a very important life giving movement in the Anglican Church of Australia.'

In the three-day course, a set programme was offered to the participants in Hong Kong, including fifteen short talks on different aspects of faith. Bishop Ian, The Revd Will Newman, and The Revd Robert Martin, together with thirteen members of the Anglican Church of Australia, each gave a talk to the participants.

'The talks were lively and we had certain things to say. We also included some of our own personal journeys in the short talks,' Leanne Doyle, one of the Anglicans from Perth, told In Touch. Confidentiality is an essential part of the course. 'What happens at Cursillo stays at Cursillo. Everybody feels safe and comfortable, so they feel free to speak and share their personal experiences with the community from the beginning.'

Rodger O'Hara, another Anglican from Bendigo, said, 'We are Christians and we are vulnerable, too. We are not perfect: we have troubles and problems. However, we have shared faith.' He enjoyed taking part in the Cursillo course. 'The participants from Hong Kong were very open and very ready for the course. They accepted and trusted us. It's lovely.'

Madeline Foo, one of the participants, viewed the course as a short stop to rejuvenate oneself through faith. 'Personal testimonies were powerful and uplifting. As each day progressed, I found myself humming hymns and looking forward to the sharing and fellowship ahead. I learnt to be still before God after a chat with one of the spiritual advisors, being at peace while praying for an answer.'

Another participant Saki Tsoi said, 'I would recommend this course for anyone who looks to deepen their spiritual life. This Spiritual Journey suits us best as it perfectly blends rational thinking, personal reflections, liturgies, prayers, and songs into this wonderful journey.'

'The way in which Cursillo moves is not because people read books or follow

instructions on a web page, but because somebody comes and shares with them.' Bishop lan said, 'In Cursillo, we talk about having a three-day introductory course. Then we talk about the fourth day after that, which is the rest of the time, the rest of one's life. And it is in that fourth day, when the community that has been formed in the Cursillo is continued within the life of the church, and of the wider community.'

There is an expectation that after the course, the 'Cursillistas' (Cursillo participants) will continue to meet regularly in small groups with others from Cursillo, to support, challenge and encourage each other in three aspects of Christian living: Study, Prayer, and Action.

'In Australia, people would be going into the fourth day, such as being involved in prison visiting, taking communion to nursing homes, ministry to the sick in hospital, and helping the needy. Some people, after their Cursillo, went on to discover God's calling to ordination within the church and they had followed the vocation,' Bishop Ian noted.

'For Hong Kong, the way forward is about those who have completed the three-day course to continue to meet together in the fourth day, to encourage each other to draw other people in as well, and to be a powerful group that goes out in action in the wider community.' Bishop Ian told In Touch.

MICHAELMAS FAIR

ONE PRIEST, MANY QUALITIES

To say it was a memorable event when Fr Desmond Cox gave his first sermon after arriving in Hong Kong in September 2001 is a bit of an understatement. It happened the first Sunday after 9/11 which had shocked the world. And is characteristic of his sermons, the first was as upbeat, enthusiastic and full of thought-provoking challenges as they have been ever since. But given the horror of 9/11, this didn't please everyone at the time...

Before being ordained in 1974, the Archbishop of Perth explained that for priests to be successful in urban, multicultural parishes, they should go abroad and experience some Asian cultures. Fr Des spent over a month visiting Japan, Thailand, Indonesia and Hong Kong. It was both a frightening and fascinating experience for him, but led to his being well-equipped for his future roles, which included an industrial parish, two rural parishes, and one of the roughest in Perth.

These formative years really helped Fr Des become the enabling Priest he now is. Adapting to the local culture has been one of his mantras. "Culturalisation is essential to a successful ministry, being part of the community and understanding the local way of life".

After ten years as Regional Director for the Anglican Board of Mission, he moved to Darwin. Whilst there, Hong Kong advertised for a new Priest-in-charge at Discovery Bay – his godfather saw it in the Church Times and the rest, as they say is history!

Arriving back in Hong Kong, he was impressed with the dynamic and teamspirited clergy, the vision of the Province, and an impressive outreach ministry, which remains to this day.

Fr Des has been involved in many aspects of pastoral work, including development of the Children's Ministry, All Age Worship, introducing the evangelistic course, Emmaus, throughout the Province, and HIV education. Additionally, he has held many positions, such as President of the Queensway Rotary Club, Chaplain to the Australian and New Zealand Consulates, and is one of the founding members of the Archbishop of Canterbury's Anglican Alliance.

One of his greatest joys has been as Chaplain at Ming Wah Theological College, nurturing postulants and seeing them through to being ordained. Another was producing four major musicals whilst at Discovery Bay (even making guest appearances!) and more recently in July 2018, Fr Des was awarded the Frank Coldrake medal, given for "services to the Australian Church and Anglican Communion" in recognition of exceptional service to God's mission.

Fr Des believes he was destined to spend over a third of his ordained life in Hong Kong. He feels the Cathedral is finally finding its Anglican identity in this Asian city and people are more committed to their Christian life. He is grateful that the Province and St John's Cathedral have graciously allowed him to stay on pending completion of arrangements to live in Australia. Whilst Fr Des may have mixed emotions about the next chapter, it will never be a permanent goodbye to Hong Kong, which will always be in his heart and soul.

Fr Des has chosen two choruses which sum up his ministry and life:

"Here I am, Lord. Is it I, Lord? I have heard you calling in the night. I will go, Lord, if you lead me. I will hold your people in my heart."

"What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd I would bring a lamb.

If I were a wise man, I would do my part, Yet what I can I give him, give him my heart."

On the day before (6th October), guests from around the world joined local Anglicans for a colourful celebration to mark the 20th anniversary of the HKSKH. The Thanksgiving Eucharist was held at the AsiaWorld-Expo centre. The celebrant was Archbishop Paul Kwong and the sermon was given by the

Anglican Communion Secretary General, Dr Josiah Idowu-Fearon. Thousands gathered for the Thanksgiving Eucharist and continued the celebration by joining the Thanksgiving Dinner in the evening.

NEW STUDY SHOWS 40% OF MIGRANT DOMESTIC WORKERS INVOLVED IN ELDERLY CARE

The Mission For Migrant Workers (MFMW) has released the results of its recent survey on elderly care. As many as 40% of migrant domestic workers are engaged in elderly care work, an indication that support for migrant domestic workers who take care of elderly persons is seriously inadequate, thus adversely affecting their well-being.

Elderly care work is widespread among migrant domestic workers, on top of their other household chores. The research "Migrants and Elderly Care: Investigating the conditions, concerns, and needs of migrant domestic workers who are involved in elderly care and assistance", supported by the St John's Cathedral Endowment Fund, was conducted through a survey of more than 1500 migrant domestic workers.

The findings revealed that as many as 40% of MDWs are engaged in elderly care work with three-quarters (74%) of them taking care of a single elderly person. Two-thirds (61%) of 616 respondents giving elderly care have wards who require additional assistance because either they "walk with assistance/ assistive device" (31%), are "wheelchair bound" (19%), or are "bedridden" (11%).

Migrant domestic workers in elderly care work provide a wide range of care and assistance to their elderly wards, which includes ensuring their food and nutrition, providing various medical-related services, assisting in their personal hygiene, and accompanying the elderly to physical and social activities. Only 10% of the 616 respondents said that they are only responsible for taking care of the elderly. An overwhelming majority (90%) of respondents in elderly care work do not exclusively perform that task.

"The workers said their workload was very heavy, especially if there were children in the household," said Johannie Tong, the lead researcher and the MFMW's Community Relations Officer.

Legislative Council member Fernando Cheung was invited to the public launch of the research on 28 September. He responded, "I feel shame that we are putting the responsibility for a lot of care for the elderly, young, and chronically ill on foreign domestic helpers."

According to the MFMW, the current situation raises important questions on the ambiguity of domestic work, the rights of domestic workers as workers, family relations, and elderly care work as a social or public responsibility, as opposed to a household responsibility or individual responsibility. The situation needs to be remedied, because it not only affects the workers' overall well-being, but also their work in caring for the elderly.







SPEAKER SERIES FOR FILIPINO CONGREGATION

Fr Dwight dela Torre started hosting an ongoing Sunday Speaker Series in autumn 2018. The series covers topics that the Filipino congregation might be interested in, such as cancer treatments and HIV prevention. Cancer expert Dr Janice Tsang was one of the guest speakers of the series. The talks were well received by congregation members.

The editor Samuel Wells has been Vicar of St Martin-in-the-Fields since 2012. He has served as a parish priest for 20 years, 10 of those in urban priority areas. He spent seven years in North Carolina, where he was Dean of Duke University Chapel. He is also a noted Anglican writer, broadcaster and scholar.

A NEW ATTRACTION

Time calls it one of the world's greatest places in 2018, 'Tai Kwun' Centre for Heritage and Arts, Hong Kong's largest-ever restoration project, has been open since summer. The freshly minted Tai Kwun offers an exceptional glimpse of Hong Kong's heritage to the public in the heart of Central.

Tai Kwun is a complex of buildings and was once a one-stop shop for law, order, and justice. Its heritage significance was recognised in 1955 when its three key areas – the Former Central Police Station, Central Magistracy, and Victoria Prison – were gazetted as Declared Monuments.
